PREFACE

The DHSK College, originally named the Dibrugarh College way back in 15th June, 1945 with only seven students and two teachers, was established with a vision: *Gyanat Parantara Na Hi* (Nothing Better than Knowledge) to cater to the needs of higher education in the upper Assam. Later it was renamed after its donors as Dibrugarh Hanumanbax Surajmall Kanoi College in 1957. It is a pleasure to remember even today that Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan, the then Vice-President of India came all the way from Delhi to inaugurate the College building. At the inception the college was affiliated to Calcutta University. From 1948 it became affiliated to Gauhati University. The college was instrumental for conceptualisation of establishment of Dibrugarh University in 1965, and College changed its affiliation into this University. This Institution of higher Education had a major role in establishment of Dibrugarh University. Two nearby Colleges namely DHSK Commerce College and MDK Girls' College had also their origin in this College itself. The financial aspects of the college is chiefly dependent on the Government of Assam and University Grants Commission.

The total land area in possession of the college is 16.61 acres. The College has ever been working very hard to maintain peace and tranquillity in the campus especially by keeping cordial and friendly relationship with the inhabitants in its vicinity.

The College has in total eighteen departments. Except Hindi, Bengali and Computer Science, all the departments offer Major courses. The number of successful candidates in final University Examinations has been excellent since its inception.

The institution being a non-autonomous one does not enjoy the facilities of framing and designing the curriculum on its own. The college has also begun its quest for attaining self-sufficiency and excellence through unrelenting all round efforts. Resource mobilization from various funding agencies has been taken up as a major endeavour to improve the infrastructure and to incorporate modern teaching learning facilities.

The college is now preparing for second cycle of accreditation by NAAC. Considering all the aspects of the college this SSR has been prepared and submitted to NAAC for assessment. I would like to acknowledge the efforts of all the members of the IQAC, the faculty members, the administrative staff and students for their support in our journey towards excellence.

The entire work of the preparation of this SSR has been of immense help in defining policies, strategies, systems and procedure in a better way to serve the course of future growth and development of the College.

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Executive Summary

The DHSK College was established with only seven students and two teachers on 15th June, 1945 with a vision: Gyanat Parantara Na Hi (Nothing Better than Knowledge) to cater to the needs of higher education in upper Assam. At the inception, the college was affiliated to the Calcutta University. From 1948 it became affiliated to the Gauhati University. The college was instrumental for conceptualisation of establishment of the Dibrugarh University in 1965, and the College changed its affiliation into this University (Appendix I). A concrete mission and vision of the College was envisioned and this has been implemented in letter and spirit since inception of the College. The College strictly follows the course curriculum designed by Dibrugarh University, Dibrugarh. A few faculty member of the College are members of departmental Board of Studies (BoS) and different other bodies of Dibrugarh University and as such contributes towards design and development of curriculum of the University. The College provides all the necessary support to the faculty members so that the curriculum can be implemented effectively. The faculty members take utmost care that this curriculum is completed within the stipulated time. The college conducts two self financing certificate programmes at present.

Teaching-Learning and Evaluation:

The College follows an effective and transparent admission process. During the admission process the College strictly adheres to the reservation policy as per government rules. There are two streams, i.e. Arts and Science, at the UG level which includes 17 disciplines and PG courses in English Literature in arts. During the last five years, the College introduced skill based course, Theatrical Arts, other than computer related course. The College makes an effort to sensitise its staff and students on the issues such as gender, environment and scientific temperament by organising various activities towards realising these objectives. There is a mechanism in place to carry out the teaching-learning and evaluation process in an organised manner. In this context, the Principal, IQAC and the departments collaborate to achieve the desired results. The faculty members, in order to make the teaching learning process more effective, undertake innovative teaching methods. Remedial classes are organised to meet the extra needs of students. Seminars, assignments, group discussions etc. helps the students to a great extent to develop their personality. Those are used for internal

assessment also. To nurture their critical thinking and creativity, the students are encouraged to participate in different programmes organised outside the purview of the curriculum. The library of the College has a substantial collection of books and journals available to the students. The faculty members of the College have accumulated experience in teaching and are always committed to helping the students to meet the demands of present day needs. The College Examination Cell works in conducting examination and evaluation as per rules and guidelines of the affiliating University. The College is able to achieve a consistent academic performance of students by producing many rank holders.

Research Consultancy and Extension:

The College provides adequate support to its faculty members to pursue research activities. In spite of many limitations, the Research and Consultancy Sub-Committee of IQAC encourages faculty members to participate in various research works. In the last five years the teachers of the College have published more than 300 books/research papers/articles. During the last five years the College has to its credit one Major projects and six Minor Projects (completed and ongoing).

A good number of teachers have published research papers/articles in various journals/books reflecting the thirst for academic excellence. The College regularly organises seminars, workshops, etc. for the enrichment of the students and the faculty members with funding from agencies like UGC, DST etc. A major constraint for the teachers in getting actively engaged in research activities is the extra work load of the teachers for conducting classes at higher secondary level (10+2) as per state government rule. Keeping in mind its vision and objectives, the College is always interested to promote relationship with neighbouring communities. In spite of the efforts for research activities, the College is yet to develop a structured policy for promoting consultancy services and industrial linkages.

> Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

The College has a policy for the development of the infrastructural facilities for improving academic excellence. Such infrastructural projects are funded by different agencies like UGC, DST and Government of Assam. The College also generates funds for infrastructural development from the students' fees, donations and MP/ MLAs' aid funds. The College has a large campus with 16.6 acres of land which houses the Academic Campus, Hostels, Health Centre, Canteen, Auditorium, Conference Hall and

Playground. To keep pace with the technological advancement, the College has set up three digital class rooms. The faculties of the laboratories of the College are supported by DST and government of Assam, but their infrastructure are yet to be fully developed. The reading space of the College Library has been expanded to accommodate more than 120 readers. The library also remains open during vacations. The cataloguing of the library has been computerised with the latest *SOUL* software. Phase wise automation of the office is going on. In a partial fulfilment of the automation process, the admission process has already been upgraded. Installation process of Wi-fi facility is underway to make it operational within the campus for academic purpose. The College has two hostels for boys and girls, but the hostels need to be improved in terms of infrastructure.

> Student Support and Progression:

The College has a mechanism to disseminate information to all the stakeholders. The College prospectus, website, Students' Diary and *Messenger* (e-mail) software are the official means to convey information. The College has a Student Welfare Fund to support students belonging to economically weaker section. The College also facilitates students to avail various scholarships of government and other agencies. To address the problems faced by the slow learners, the College arranges special classes, tutorials and remedial classes. Coaching classes are also organised for students appearing in competitive examinations. Academic and Career Counselling services are also provided. The students can avail medical service from the First Aid Centre of the College. The College has an Anti Ragging Cell to curb the menace of ragging. For the overall development of the students, the College organises various extra-curricular and co-curricular programmes with active participation of the students. Besides the annual College magazine, all the departments and the hostels publish wall magazines which are contributed and edited by the students. To ensure participatory democracy, the College has included student representatives in different committees and cells.

The College has followed government rules in matters relating to reservations and special considerations. There is a provision for reservation of seats for the donors of the college. The College is sensitive towards the differently able persons, but is yet to develop the necessary infrastructure up to the mark. The College has produced a number of successful alumni in various fields of national and international repute, but



has not been able to harness their services due to lack of proper network. However, some departments have maintained a cordial and fruitful relationship with alumni.

Solution Governance, Leadership and Management:

The College is governed by the principle of participatory democracy while maintaining a hierarchical set up for smooth and effective functioning. The College has an internal management system under the leadership of the Principal. The Governing Body, the Principal, the IQAC and the staff work together for designing and implementation of policies of the College. The leadership also encourages the participation of the various stakeholders and maintain a cordial relationship with all of them. Many of the perspective plans of the College have materialised under the guidance of the leadership. The authority takes the necessary steps to improve available human resources and for maximum utilisation of existing facilities in the College. Faculty members are encouraged to pursue research activities. The authority attends to resolve grievances and complaints raised by different stakeholders. Faculty empowerment strategies and office development programmes are adopted to enhance professionalism of the staff and to equip them with skills. With a view to improving the functioning and streamlining the administrative functioning process, the College has been moving ahead with office automation in a phased manner. However, complete automation is yet to be accomplished. Various welfare schemes are available to the members of the staff. A financial management system is in place to manage the financial resources both for academic and administrative purposes. Accounts are audited by both internal as well as government auditors.

The IQAC plays a leading role in enhancing and maintaining the academic and administrative quality of the College. Amongst the different functions of the IQAC, the process of collecting students' feedback and execution of Teaching Plan and Report (Teacher's Diary) can be highlighted.

> Innovations and Best Practises:

The College makes a conscious effort to develop eco-friendly atmosphere, though it has not conducted green audit till now. The College is sensitive towards the growing development in the field of energy conservation, but it has not made enough progress. The College has taken initiatives like shifting to CFL/LED lights. Plantation programmes are conducted by the College in various occasions. Recently, to deal with the problem of artificial water logging in the campus, the College has developed the



drainage system. College is initiating to inculcate environment awareness among the students through the various activities.

One among the best practices of the College is the adoption of the *Charaihabi Mising Gaon* (a tribal village of the Mising Community) and three High Schools (Bokel High School, Graham Bazar Girls' High School and Public High School) which are located in the outskirts of Dibrugarh. The other best practice of the College is the effort made to popularise literature, art and culture. This practice has resulted in the formation of a cultural group, *Ramdhenu* (Rainbow) which was exclusively initiated by students.

SWOC ANALYSIS:

(1) Strengths:

- ➤ DHSK College is governed by the principles of participatory democracy while maintaining a hierarchical setup for smooth and effective functioning.
- The guardians and other stakeholders of the College give their suggestions on over all development through their representative in the GB of the College and also through Teachers'-Guardians' meetings.
- The IQAC plays a leading role in enhancing and maintaining the academic and administrative quality of the College. It takes feedback annually from the students on teaching-learning process. The analysis of the feedback is then individually communicated to all concerned.
- The College follows an effective and transparent admission process.
- The College has two streams, i.e. Arts and Science, at the UG level which includes 17 disciplines and PG courses in English Literature. The College also offers two add-on courses. The College has also recognised the importance of the distance mode of education and has established a KKHSOU centre.
- ➤ In the last four years the College has produced a number of 595 graduates securing first class.
- ➤ The College Library has been computerised with OPAC/ SOUL system. Faculty members are availing *N-List Inflibnet* facility. Every department also has its own departmental library. There is a Digital Library in the college.



- Remedial classes are organised by the College for the students who are academically weak and need special attention.
- ➤ The College has adopted three High Schools and a Tribal Village 25 KM away from it.
- The College is enriched with 16.61 acres of land.
- > All the departments have computers with internet facility.
- ➤ The College has a First Aid Centre having basic medical facilities.
- The College has a vibrant Internal Career Guidance Cell. The Cell organises coaching classes for different competitive examinations.
- ➤ In the last five years the teachers of the College have published more than 500 books, chapters in books, research papers, research articles and other articles.
- ➤ Dr. Atikuddin Ahmed, recipient of *OIL Siksha-Ratna* award, is a member of the College Development Council of Dibrugarh University.
- > Ten faculties of the College are members of Undergraduate Board of Studies of Different Departments of Dibrugarh University.
- ➤ Mr. Mridul Sarma, a faculty of the department of Assamese is a member of Undergraduate and Post graduate Board of Studies of North Lakhimpur College (Autonomous), affiliated to Dibrugarh University.
- ➤ Dr. Ranjan Changmai, a faculty of the department of Physics is a member of Academic Council of Dibrugarh University.
- Ms. Tribeni Saikia, a faculty of the department of Physics is a member of Undergraduate Board of Dibrugarh University.
- At present, the College has 25 (34%) faculty members with Ph.D. degree and 13 (Thirteen) faculty members are pursuing their research works leading to Ph. D. degree.
- > The Institution has a Bio-Tech Hub.
- ➤ The College has active and vibrant NSS and NCC units comprising two battalions for boys and girls.
- There are three Digital Classrooms and Public Announcement System in the College.
- > The students are encouraged to participate in different programmes organised outside the purview of the classrooms which has resulted in the



- formation of a cultural group, *Ramdhenu* (Rainbow) at the initiative of its students.
- ➤ There are Ramps and Wheel Chair facility for differently able students and teachers.
- The college is instrumental for conceptualisation of establishment of the Dibrugarh University. The University started its academic activities with two PG departments and its functioning in this College.
- The College has a consumer society with an asset of Rupees two crores.

(ii) Weaknesses:

- ➤ Being an affiliated college, it has a very limited scope to contribute in the designing and development of the course curriculum.
- ➤ During the last five years, the College has not been able to introduce new vocational courses other than a computer related course and a course of Theatrical arts.
- ➤ Both the boys' and girls' hostels need to be improved in terms of infrastructure to meet the present day needs.
- Though the College has the benefit of possessing a large area of land, it is yet to be utilised to its full potential.
- ➤ Though the College tries to help the physically and visually challenged persons it has no specific infrastructural facilities to meet all their requirements.
- The health centre of the College has no ambulance of its own.
- The College still has the shortage of Class rooms.
- The College has no specific policy to get grants from industries and other corporate agencies for developing research facilities or infrastructure.
- The College is yet to develop a structured policy for promoting consultancy services and industrial linkages.
- ➤ Complete automation of the office is yet to be accomplished.
- A number of teaching and non teaching posts are lying vacant.
- ➤ The College is getting less contribution / support from the Alumni Association.



(iii) Opportunities:

- Many faculty members are members of different departmental BoS of Dibrugarh University, where they have a role in curriculum development.
- There is scope for introducing new certificate and diploma courses.
- The old building of the college can be preserved as a Heritage Structure and new buildings can be constructed.
- The contribution and involvement of the Alumni Association is yet to be materialised.
- ➤ The College with its high enrolment rate and its policy of inclusiveness and integration provides educational opportunities for a diverse category of students from many ethnic groups in Upper Assam. In this situation the College can strive towards attaining grants from the government for opening new courses relating to *Tribal and Folklore Studies*.
- ➤ DHSK College is one amongst a very short list of colleges offering courses in both Arts and Science streams, thus having the potential to shape the career of students with varied interests.
- ➤ The College has over the years progressed to a stage where it can become a conversing platform for scholars, educationists, scientists, artists and the students.
- ➤ The College has the opportunity to generate solar energy for self reliance.
- The unutilised land of the College can be used for further extension of the academic infrastructure, sports, and recreation complexes.
- ➤ Despite the infrastructural constraints the College is making every effort to introduce more PG courses to meet the demand of the present academic needs

(iv) Challenges:

- ➤ Due to limited space and staff in the library, it becomes a challenge to accommodate a large number of students and therefore specific days have been allotted for each class to borrow books.
- > To maintain a consistent academic performance of students with a comparatively lower input at the entry level is a challenge for the College.
- ➤ In the last few years, frequent strikes and *bandhs* called by different organizations have affected the regular execution of the lesson plan to some



- extent. In such situations, the teachers overcome the challenges by arranging extra classes.
- ➤ Completion of courses and revision in time is a matter of thought, because the teachers are required to take part in classes, examination and evaluation works in the 10+2 stage. This has created a constraint for the teachers in active participation in research activities.
- ➤ The College is finding difficulties in tackling to cater the needs of Higher Secondary students; the challenge lies in juggling and managing the two totally different systems one Annual and the other Semester.
- > Crunch of finance to use the available land for infrastructural development.
- ➤ To involve the Alumni in the development of the College to the desired level.
- ➤ The high teacher-student ratio in some departments than the prescribed one is a challenge.
- ➤ In today's troubled times the need of the hour is to inculcate the values of discipline, ethics and the spirit of co-operation, apart from academic zeal in the mind of the students is a worth mentioning.
- ➤ Even while facing the chronic problem of artificial flood in the College, the teachers and students strive to maintain normal functioning of classes.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation:

The DHSK College was established on 15th of June 1945. This pioneer institution of the North-East India has always been at the fore-front of educational progress and innovation. The institution was established with the primary aim of imparting higher education to the students of the region.

> Vision:

To fulfill the societal needs and for the up-lift of the student community by fostering a sense of discipline and imparting higher education.

> Mission:

- To promote higher education so that students graduating from the college receive quality education and better job opportunities.
- To pay special attention to the moral, intellectual and cultural development of students.
 - To inculcate discipline and moral values into young minds.
- To create a healthy academic environment for dissemination of quality education.

Objectives:

- To provide opportunity and a platform to learners from all sections of the society in shaping their careers by making them employable.
 - To create a gender friendly ambience in the college.
 - To foster value education to upgrade learners' skill and attitude.
 - To enable learners to cope with competitive environment.
 - To introduce job oriented courses.
 - To foster internal resource generation and mobilization
 - To ensure sustainable development.
 - To ensure computerization in the basic operational activities.
 - To ensure adequate infrastructure and support system of quality education.
 - To ensure effective execution of teaching plan.

1.1.2. How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific examples:

The institution meticulously develops action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. It directs all departments and staff members to prepare a mandatory teaching plan for each course/programme. The Principal convenes meetings regularly with the Heads of the Departments to adopt strategies for

effective implementation of the curriculum. Each faculty member delivers lectures and also prepares study materials for the students. Priority is given to complete the syllabus within the stipulated time. Two sessional tests are conducted prior to each end-semester examination. Students are accessed by home assignments, participation in Seminar/Group Discussion etc.

1.1.3. What type of support (procedural & practical) do the teachers receive (from the university and/or institution) for effectively transaction curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The affiliating university provides the entire course syllabus, list of text and reference books, question patterns, practical guidelines etc., which enable the teachers to follow the curriculum for each semester and changes if any. Except a few, all departments have access to internet and LCD projectors in the class rooms. Many teachers have served as Resource Persons, Guest Speakers in different Workshops and Seminars. Workshops and Seminars are organized for the learners.

1.1.4. Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and translation on the curriculum provided by the affiliating university or other statutory agency:

The curriculum in designed by the Dibrugarh University and the affiliating colleges strictly adhere to it. In accordance with the syllabus, study materials are updated from time to time and the students are kept abreast with latest knowledge in their field of study. Latest books and journals on the concerned subjects are procured by the college library. Besides, students are taken on educational, historical, industrial, geographical tours to provide them with first hand field knowledge on various curricular & extra co-curricular aspects.

The institution motivates the concerned departments to take its students to visit various educational institutions.

There are two courses:

- Three months Certificate Programme in Assamese DTP with PageMaker & Photoshop (started from 2016). The skills and knowledge acquired through the syllabus will enable the students to work in a variety of professions such as Typist, Graphic designing, advertising, Lay-out design, Page Designing, Book Layout Designing etc.
- ➤ Three month Certificate Programme in Theatrical Arts (started from 2016). This syllabus intends to impart theatre, media, communications and community knowledge development. The students can have job opportunities such as Actor / Dancer / Performer, Art Administration, Light Designing / Technician, Sound Designer / Technician, Playback Music Designer, Media Arts Production, Choreographer, Playwright etc.

1.1.8. How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The institution monitors the student's involvement and their performance through written tests conducted regularly. Feedback system helps to monitor the performance of the faculty and the status of syllabus completion. The university examination results are reviewed and based on the achievements of the students; proper guidance and counseling are carried out to meet the objectives of the curriculum.



1.2. Academic Flexibility:

1.2.1. Specifying the goals and objectives, give details of the certificate/diploma/skill development courses etc. offered by the institution:

The college offers one skill development course- information and computer technology which is a part of the TDC syllabus. The aim of the course is to give the students the basic concept of computer / Internet use etc.

1.2.2. Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning/dual degree? If 'yes' give details:

The institution offers a few add on parallel courses under the Krishna Kanta Handique Open University, which can lead to a dual degree, provided the degrees are not of the same discipline.

- ➤ BPP (Bachelor Preparatory Program) the subjects taught are English, Assamese, Bengali, Hindi, Political Science, Economics, Sociology and Education.
- ➤ Under Graduate Course in English, Assamese, Bengali, Hindi, Political Science, Economics, Sociology, education, History.
- ➤ Post Graduate courses in Sociology and Political Science. The courses are planned in such a way that it does not clash with the normal teaching time of the regular degree programmes. Classes are held on Sunday.
- ➤ The institution has a Distance Education programme of Tezpur University, which offers post graduate courses.

1.2.3. Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skill development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability:

The college has flexible educational programmes in terms of distance programmes, which can be pursued by students parallel with their regular degree programmes provided it does not lead to the same degree.

1.2.4. Does the institution offer self financed programmes? If 'yes list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.:

At present there are two courses in the nature of distance education offered by Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (K.K.H.S.O.U) and Centre for Open and Distance Learning, (C.O.D.L.) Tezpur University.

Admission procedures for the above:

- K.K.H.S.O.U: Admission is only through study centre in the college
- C.O.D.L.: Admissions through notifications in the newspapers and online forms.

> Curriculum development:

- KKHSOU: The curriculum is designed by the Open University.
- CODL: The curriculum is made available to the learners by the Center for Open and Distance Learning, Tezpur University.



1.2.5. Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programmes and the beneficiaries:

The college has a biotechnology hub, which caters to the needs of students, research scholars providing them with adequate laboratory facility.

1.2.6. Does the university provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/curriculum of their choice? If 'yes' how does the institution take advantage of such provisions for the benefit of students?

Dibrugarh University has not implemented CBCS so far in the Under Graduate programmes; hence the learners cannot combine parallel courses under various distant learning programmes. However the same University offers undergraduate certificate/diploma courses in the college in the Distance Mode.

- 1.3. Curriculum Enrichment:
- 1.3.1. Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's curriculums ensure that the academic programmes and institution goals and objectives are integrated?

The guiding principle of the college is to provide higher education to students from all spectrum of the society and to evolve a participatory system that allows the stakeholders to work in tandem. The institution believes in providing holistic education to the students so that they can develop a sense of belonging and ownership and inculcate moral, cultural and social values.

To ensure the objectives, the institution tries to integrate the academic programmes of the university within the framework of the academic calendar. There is an attempt to create student-centric activity like organizing seminars, workshops, guest lectures, field work, Study-tour.

1.3.2. What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The college suggests ways and means to the university to modify/enrich/organize the curriculum as per the experience/difficulties/benefits of the students by collecting feedback from the teachers and students. Teachers are regularly invited to the under graduate Board of Studies of the respective departments.

1.3.3. Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, I.C.T. etc. into the curriculum:

The college is concerned with issues like Gender, Human Rights, Climate Change, Environmental education etc. which are incorporated into the syllabus. Environmental science education is a part of the syllabus.

The college has a Cell for Women's Studies and Development and a Society for Environmental Conservation (SOFEC). All departments have their Study Circles/Forums who organizes regular Talks/Seminars/Workshop etc. relating to syllabi.



1.3.4. What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

The college observes national events like the Independence Day, Republic Day and Gandhi Jayanti with an enthusiastic participation of students, faculty and staff. Philosophical lectures are delivered by eminent personalities and faculties on these occasions.

1.3.5. Citing a few examples, enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum:

Based on the students' feedback, each department analyses the shortcomings and requirements and frames necessary strategies to address the shortcomings and enrich the curriculum.

1.3.6. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enriching programs?

There is no formal mechanism as such to monitor or evaluate the quality of enrichment. However, a keen eye is kept on the learner's behaviour and learning outcome.

1.4. Feedback System:

1.4.1. What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Being an affiliated college the institution does not have a direct role in preparing the curriculum. However several teachers of the college are engaged as subject experts in preparing the syllabus of various subjects by virtue of being members of Under Graduate Board of Studies.

1.4.2. Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum? If 'yes' how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for Curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes??

Yes, a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students does exist, but the feedback is not communicated to the University. It is used only to internally upgrade and modify curricular/academic progress.

1.4.3. How many new programs/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new course/programs?

MA in English has been introduced from the session 2016. There is a need to educate the students in English literature. This also enhances the chance of employability of the students.

There are two Certificate Programmes:

- Assamese DTP with Page maker and Photoshop (Three months) &
- ➤ Theatrical Arts (Three months) introduced from the session 2016. The course of Theatrical Arts is conducted in collaboration with *Akhara Ghar*, Dibrugarh.

The institution maintains publicity of the admission procedure through:

- ➤ Notification in the college website.
- > Clear citation in the prospectus.
- > Advertisement in news papers.
- Advertisement in the local media.
- ➤ Hosting banners.

The institution ensures transparency in the admission process by the methods:

- > Online submission of form is introduced.
- ➤ College management software is used.
- ➤ Prior to the date of admission provisional merit list of the applicants is notified in the college notice board as well as in the college website.
 - Admission is conducted in an open house manner.
- Announcement of the name and the marks of a candidate according to the merit list are made.
- ➤ Power point presentation of the names and marks of selected applicants for different subject combination is displayed.

Admission is conducted on the basis of merit at the previous qualifying examination (class XII) of any boards like Assam Higher Secondary Education Council, Central Board of Secondary Education etc. Reservation of seats for backward communities, Scheduled sections of the society, differently able person as per government of Assam rules is ensured as well.

2.1.3. Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district:

2.1.4. Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, the college authority convenes meetings with the Head of the Departments before the commencement of each academic session. In such meetings the Principal, the Vice-principals, the admission committee and Heads of the Departments sit together. Analysis of drawbacks and steps taken for improvements for the following year are scrutinized and modifications made accordingly. Prior to the meetings, the members of the Department Management Committee of each department discuss and suggestions are put forward. The followings are some of the worth mentioning outcomes of such effort:

➤ One such reform was introduced in 2013 for admission into Major courses. Students were given a choice for enlisting their subjects of preference in Major.



Accordingly, and as per seat capacity, they were selected for the subjects of their preference. The remaining students were directed to other departments of their successive preferences.


- ➤ The college has been trying to keep the students' profiles in the admission level by introducing College Management Software (CMS). CMS was introduced in the admission process of B.Sc. programme in 2015. Subsequently, the same has been introduced for both B.A and B.Sc. programme in 2016.
- ➤ The prospectus and forms are made available online as well as in the college office.
 - ➤ Online submission of Form has been introduced in 2016.


The consequences of such reviews have made the admission process more transparent. This exercise significantly reduced the number of "frequently asked questions" by the aspirants.

Students' profile in terms of reservation categories is followed as per government rules. There is also a provision of quota for sports and cultural activities and free admission for economically backward students.

2.1.5. Reflecting on the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for following categories of students, enumerate on how the admission policy of the institution and its student profiles demonstrate/ reflect the National commitment to diversity and inclusion:

The college is committed to implementing strategies that reflect policies of National diversity and inclusion. The college maintains quota norms as per state government rules: 15% for OBC/MOBC, 7% for SC, 10% for ST (Plain), 5% for ST (Hills), 3% for differently able etc. Concession during admission to economically weaker sections and special quota to athletes, sports persons and students excelling in different cultural fields is ensured. During the academic session 2016, the college has given admission to students in the following pattern:







The free admission in regards of fees for students from the families whose parents income is less than one lakh per annum has executed as per State Government directives in the year 2016 .Besides, a student has been admitted by the college authority with a complete fee waiver.

Comments:

- From 2011 onwards the Semester system was introduced in the institution under Dibrugarh University. The demand ratio (3.26) in B.A. was highest in the year 2013- 2014. A small decrease is seen particularly in B.A programme with demand ratio 3.18 in the year 2014-2015 and with 2.57 in the year 2015-2016. Likewise, a small decrease in the demand ratio of B.Sc. programme is seen from 2015 (3.20) to 2016(2.69). This variation is due to increase of number of seats. Moreover, the preference of a large number of students to professional courses and a trend of studying in metropolitan cities outside the state is another reason.
- The number of seats has been increased from 300 (2015) to 475 for B.Sc. and 412 for B.A in 2016. The increase in the intake is due to large number of applicants and, a Directive of Govt. of Assam to accommodate students and social obligation.
- D H S Kanoi College happens to be the first preference destination in the upper Assam and one of the colleges of attraction of students from Arunachal Pradesh.
- The institution has started P.G courses in English in 2016 under Dibrugarh University and the institution is getting very good response from applicants. The institution is also taking initiative to introduce P.G courses in economics.

2.2. Catering to Student Diversity:

2.2.1. How the institution caters to the need of differently-able students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard:

The college ensures specific provisions that cater to the needs of differently able students. These include-

- ➤ Provision for 3% reservation of seats for differently able students each in arts and science stream as per Govt. rule.
 - Class room facilities on the ground floor.
- ➤ Separate/ convenient seating arrangement during class hours and examinations.
 - Three wheel chairs.
 - > Ramps for differently able persons.
 - ➤ Borrowing of library books with more convenience.
- Apart from the above aspects, the peers are encouraged to assist the differently-able students.



2.2.2. Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process:

Yes, the interactive session with the student is arranged at the time of commencement of each academic session. The students are informed about the facilities, rules and regulations of the institution by the Principal, Vice-Principal and teachers. In this meeting, the Principal and the teachers try to know the students needs also. Students also get chance to speak about their needs at the time of fresher's social

Counselling of students and interaction with them, both at the central level and departmental level are conducted. Some departments conduct guardian meet.

The first class of each course is an interactive one in their respective department. The Heads and the other teachers welcome in the first class and explain in detail about the course, syllabus, and examination rules etc. The students are also encouraged to communicate freely about their expectation, hobby and problems if any.

2.2.3. What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The college arranges extra and remedial classes to bridge the knowledge gap.

- ➤ The concerned teachers of the subject arrange extra classes to provide basic knowledge.
- Remedial classes are arranged for those students who need extra care and attention.
 - > Students are given assignment and their regular evaluation is made.
- ➤ The teachers try to detect the weak points of the students and provide mentorship to students in terms of special guidance suited to their requirements.

2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc?

The college takes special effort to sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. by organizing several workshops/lectures from time to time. The sensitization activities regarding gender, inclusion and environment are at a glance:

➤ Gender:

Gender equality, role of women in family and society, women's education, female feticides are some of the key aspects on which students and staffs are made aware of. There is also a paper on gender studies in 6th semester in Political Science. The college has a Cell for Women's Studies and Development and a women cell, a wing of Assam College Teachers' Association, DHSK College Unit that undertakes gender sensitization programmes and other related activities.

• The Cell has disseminated information on prevention and redress of sexual harassment at work place by distributing its publication "The Purple Book".



- Complaint's committee is notified in a prominent place of the college.
- Talks have been organized on Women's Movement and Debunking Myths of Matriarchy etc.
- Film shows on gender issues, open interactive sessions are organized for the teachers, students and staff on important occasions like International Women's Day.
 - The Girl Child's Week was observed in January 2014.
- International Women's Day (8th March) has been celebrated by Cell for Women's Studies and Development of the college.
- Some department and women cell of Assam College Teachers Association (ACTA) unit of the college have also arranged some programmes related to women. For example, the department of Anthropology has organized an interactive talk on "Facts and Mystery of Breast Cancer" on 1st April, 2016 which was delivered by Dr. Gayatri Gogoi (Assistant Professor and Cancer Researcher, Assam Medical College).

> Inclusion:

The fee structure at D H S K College reflects the inclusive nature. The total admission and annual fees, including the tuition fees for the session 2016-17 is as follows:

B.Sc. with major : Rs. 9060.00
 B.Sc. with non-major : Rs. 8865.00
 B.A. with major : Rs. 8185.00
 B.A. with non-major : Rs. 8055.00

It has one boys' hostel and a girls' hostel with modest accommodation fees.

As mentioned earlier, the college maintains quota norms as per state government rules: 15% for OBC/MOBC, 7% for SC, 10% for ST (Plain), 5% for ST (Hills), 3% for differently able etc. As per State Government Directive in the year 2016, the free admission for those students whose parents' income is less than one lakh per annum has been executed.

> Environment:

Environmental issues are discussed with students as a part of their syllabus (Environmental Science in T.D.C. 4th Semester course) as well as in general along with the teaching and non teaching staffs.

- Various departments of the college specially Zoology celebrate/ observe Wild Life Week, World Environmental Day, World Biosphere Day etc and discuss various important environmental issues with the students and staff of the college.
- The Society for Environmental Conservation (SOFEC), DHSK College also observes its foundation day, World Environmental Day, Wildlife Week, and World Biosphere Day by holding lectures, conservation related film show programmes, competitions etc.



2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners of a subject are identified by the concerned faculty members based on their performance in the classroom interaction and examinations. They are encouraged to read reference books and other advance learning materials and special attention are paid to them. The faculty members provide information for higher learning scopes for their future purpose. The College organise *Edu-Fair* in collaboration with The Assam Tribune and Oil India Limitad to make them well informed about various higher study options in around the country. ICGC also orient them about their future field of work and job opportunities.

2.2.6. How does the institute collect, analyze the data and information on the academic performance of the students at the risk of drop out?

The institute collects information on the academic performance of the students at the risk of drop out by their class as well as examination performance. Such students are taken special care by providing extra classes.

2.3. Teaching – Learning Process:

2.3.1. How does the college plan and organize the teaching-learning and evaluation schedules?

Teaching, learning and evaluation are indispensable mechanisms to steer the repute and intellectual growth of the students.

- ➤ The academic calendar (published in the College Prospectus) is thus framed in a manner to bring the best out of its students. The calendar clearly states all academic activities such as in-semester tests, end-semester examinations, educational tours, field study schedules, and departmental seminar/group discussion schedules etc.
- ➤ Each students and teachers are provided a diary to maintain the records of routine, syllabus, examination, other activities etc by the authority. The diary is mirror record of day to day activities of both teachers and students. It enriches discipline, punctuality and dedication of both sides.
- Some departments maintain a policy of giving handouts of teaching plans to the students at the beginning of each academic session. These teaching plans are an attempt to help the student keep track of the syllabus completed and thereby develop sincerity towards the concerned subject.
- ➤ Feedback forms are given to students to evaluate the performance of the teachers. These are analyzed and corrective measures are taken to improve the quality of teaching and learning. All these are oriented towards holistic growth of the learners.
- ➤ The teaching-evaluation process strictly adheres to the schedules and recommendations of Dibrugarh University. The faculties evaluate the scripts of two sessional examinations per semester and show them to the students and explain their weakness. Presentation of seminar is evaluated by the faculty members and mentors them to develop their skill.



2.3.2. How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

The IQAC advises plans and programmes for academic development of the college, which are implemented by the head of the institution. The following are the initiative taken by the IQAC to improve the teaching-learning process:

- ➤ Keeping record of academic performance of the teachers
- ➤ Collecting and assessing the feedback reports on teachers by the students. Necessary steps are advised.
- ➤ Organising workshops related to academic matter for the teachers. A workshop was organised on Choice based Credit System (CBCS) by the IQAC on 28.05.2016.
 - ➤ Helping the teachers in auditing API scores.
- ➤ Maintenance of the college website, Wi-Fi and other internet facilities in the college.
- ➤ Encouraging and assisting the teachers to use ICT for effective teaching, to learn new techniques and apply the same in the classroom.
 - Encourage the teachers and students for various societal works.

2.3.3. How learning is made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students:

College follows the semester system. Students are encouraged to interact in the class, frame seminar subjects and papers, participate in quizzes that various departments organize from time to time, work in intra-departmental group projects, present seminars and group presentations through the use of power-points and charts, submit home-assignments and compulsorily attend viva voce as applicable, all of which are meant to extract the best mental abilities of each student. Rather than a teacher-to-student rendition of learning, the student is made to think and respond to different topics in the concerned subject. For practical based subjects, the laboratories provide a good number of implements so that the student is acquainted with and familiarized to the practical application of the subject and thereby acquire greater proficiency.

2.3.4. How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into lifelong learners and innovators?

Education is imparted to students in a manner that they can substantiate and stand by their learning throughout their lives, emphasizing on aspects which bring out their innovative capacities, develop critical thinking and a scientific temper. Bearing this in mind, departments in the institution resort to the following methods for students:

- ➤ Encouraging students to participate in group discussions, oral, power-point/slide and chart presentations.
 - Exposure to e-learning, internet facilities, handling of computer etc.
 - Making surveys in field studies and educational tours.
 - ➤ Conducting quizzes, debates and helping students to take part in the same.



- ➤ Encouraging students to publish departmental wall-magazines, students' newsletters, the College Magazine.
 - Encouraging students to take up projects related to syllabi or on general issues.
 - Organizing talk on topic of scientific temperament.

The NSS Unit, of the College organizes awareness programmes on various occasions. Department of Anthropology has organized a sanitization programme on Scientific Understanding of Posthumous Body and Organ Donation on 20th June,2016 which was a supported programme of NCSTC, DST, Government of India.

The College has made remarkable progress in terms of innovative teaching approaches/methods to cater to the needs of the intellectual growth of the students. Faculties use ICT facilities for delivering lectures. Each department is well-equipped with computer facility and Wi-Fi. Most of the departments maintain a departmental library that is basically syllabus-centric enriched with books in the latest knowledge of discipline. The quality of teaching –learning is monitored by the departments. Students' progress or failure is discussed in the Departmental Management Committee meetings and measures are initiated to improve upon the existing learning methods, if required. Example of these measures include extra emphasis and arranging for tutorial / monitorial / extra classes in the areas where the students' performance is weak. The IQAC provides students' feedback forms which are later discussed / analyzed with reference to each teacher in the DMC meetings. 2.4.6. Has the institute introduced evaluations of teachers by the students and external peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the teaching learning process?

The college has introduced evaluation of teachers by the students through students' feedback. The teachers draw their own strategies for follow up actions in this regard. HOD meetings are held from time to time for continuous evaluation of students and quality improvement of teaching. Strategies are evolved for overcoming weaknesses.

There is no mechanism in place for external peer evaluation. However, the IQAC has initiated the mechanism with the formation of a committee, which shall conduct an Academic Audit.

2.5. Evaluation Process and Reforms:

2.5.1. How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The process of evaluation is frequently discussed among the faculty members in DMC meetings. The evaluation process is also discussed with the students from time to time. The academic calendar of the University indicates the time schedule for examination and evaluation for the year. To ensure transparency, students are allowed to go through their evaluated in–semester tests answer scripts (Session test I &II). Viva-Voce ensures one-to-one evaluation; attendance, seminar, assignment and grading ensure continuous evaluation of students.

2.5.2. What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The Dibrugarh University has implemented the semester system for under graduate programmes in 2011. Accordingly, the traditional system of annual

examination was replaced by in-semester and end-semester exams. The college has introduced the practice of conducting in-semester tests by the concerned departments, which does not disrupt classes. Department has the liberty to frame its policy for continuous evaluation. Students are allowed to go through their scripts.

2.5.3. How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution of its own?

The Principal organizes meetings with the Head of the Departments to discuss the various strategies for proper and effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University. Examination committee is constituted for smooth conduct of in-semester and end-semester examination. The In-semester exams are conducted by the departments.

The achievements of the students are recorded departmentally and their respective progress is reflected in the end-semester marks statements. Students are helped through counseling for better performance. Periodically parent-teacher-student meet is organized by the respective departments to review the teaching- learning process and find out effective evaluation method internally.

2.5.4. Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system:

The existing semester system necessitates a continuous evaluation of the student's achievements to be measured by internal and external examinations. For internal evaluation, 20 marks are allotted for each paper called Internal Assessment marks. The internal assessment mark includes marks from the 1st and 2nd session test, 5 marks each, 5 marks for viva/ home assignments/seminars, etc. and 5 marks for 95-100% attendence. This has helped in the overall development of the students as they are bound to attend classes regularly, take part in seminar or group discussion, which in turn helps the students to develop interpersonal communications. Moreover, the evaluation of students through viva voce builds confidence among the students and thus impacts the system positively.

The end semester examinations are conducted by the University as per academic calendar. For practical and skill based subjects external examiners are appointed by the University to evaluate the students' performance.

Under semester system, both internal and external evaluation process has been made time bound. Within specified time the in-semester scripts are evaluated, marks are notified and scripts are shown to the students. The pattern of question set for the end semester includes 10 percent objective type questions, 20 percent short answer type questions and 70 percent essay type questions. In the external evaluation the entire process is made speedy with the provision of on the spot evaluation of scripts by the teachers at different zones. As a result timely announcement of result has become possible.

2.5.5. Provide details on the significant improvement made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and



weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.):

Transparency in assigning weightage is strictly maintained in the semester system. Under the system, 20 marks are allotted for each paper (both major and non-major) as internal assessment. The college has developed a mechanism for ensuring rigor and transparency in internal awarding assessment marks.

As per University guidelines two in-semester examinations are conducted in the college along with viva-voce test. Student's attendance in the class is also counted for determining Internal Assessment marks.

Break-up of marks under different heads are shown below:

Students are also shown the answer scripts of their in-semester tests. Attribution of weightage to attendance has contributed to regular classes and increased participation in classroom activities.

The college has nurtured a vision of providing holistic education to the learners so that they can not only imbibe knowledge but also the wisdom to apply the knowledge effectively. The college aims to turn out skilled, employable graduates who possess not only a keen research aptitude but also are conscious of key contemporary issues and are aware of their rights as well as responsibilities. The learners are expected to inculcate and reflect ethical, cultural and social values as responsible citizens. The college ensures the inculcation of these attributes by imparting traditional knowledge along with teaching-learning practices, dissemination of updated information in relevant subjects, sensitization regarding contemporary issues and ethical values through extra-curricular and other participatory activities. Sustained efforts are made so that students attain these attributes.

2.6.3. How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The teaching, learning and assessment strategies are at par with the Dibrugarh University guidelines and curriculum. The University Curriculum is implemented by the college with specific learning objectives by following academic calendar. To supplement these objectives the college, on its part organizes different classes, guest lectures, seminars, workshops etc. to orient the students to the institutional goals. Students are encouraged to use ICT facilities and various scientific soft-wares.

2.6.4. What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placement, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

In order to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered the college organizes various training programmes which encourage the students to undertake interest in certain areas like entrepreneurship, quality jobs and innovation and research aptitude. The college has an Information and Career Guidance Cell which organizes Career Oriented programmes. For instance, the college has organized entrepreneurship programmes, workshop on documentary film making and creative writing, training for bank jobs, civil service jobs, seminar on laser technology, women's empowerment, etc.

2.6.5. How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Performances of students in both in-semester and end-semester examination in each semester is discussed in the Departmental management committee. Relevant data is kept in the departments and future planning is done accordingly. The suggestions of the outgoing students, who are pursuing higher studies and those in good positions, are taken into account for overcoming barriers of teaching-learning.



2.6.6. How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Monitoring of learning outcomes is ensured through various committees such as the IQAC, Career Guidance Cell and DMC. The meeting of HoDs, review the semester results and takes up necessary corrective measures.

Yes, the institution and individual teachers use assessment /evaluation as indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. Students are assessed according to their individual performance in in-Semester tests, viva, seminar, home assignment and their attendance in the class. Such a form of assessment/evaluation is strictly maintained in the institution. The end-semester examinations are conducted with strict adherence to the rules set by the university. The institution and the individual teachers strictly abide by the rules and takes care that the whole evaluation process is conducted in a fair way.

Research is monitored by Research- Consultancy and extension Committee of IQAC. The Institution provides space and required infrastructure facilities to the faculties. Relating to finance, the Institution also provides and facilitates book-keeping and auditing of individual research project funds.

Autonomy is provided to the Principal investigator to carry out the project.

> Timely availability or release of resources:

The college authority release funds to the investigators after getting it from the funding agency at the earliest. The investigators are allowed to attend seminars/workshops and granted duty leaves as requested.

➤ Adequate infrastructure and human resources:

The Institution provides available research facilities as per requirements of the researchers.

> Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers:

Leave for pursuing research are provided under Faculty Development Programme (FDP) of UGC for Ph.D. work wherein substitute teachers are made available. Special leave is provided to the researchers to attend seminar / conference etc.

> Support in terms of technology and information needs:

Computers as well as internet facilities are provided along with library resources and laboratory infrastructure.



> Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities:

The college provides necessary services to audit the account and other administrative records of the projects.

The College is following two policies:


> Repairing / maintenance of existing spaces:

The college is within easy reach of Hospitals and Health Centres. The Assam Medical College and Hospital (AMCH) Dibrugarh is situated about 2 Km. away from the college. In emergencies the students are taken to hospital. The college has no provision of health insurance for the students.

The ICGC of the college regularly organizes various preparatory coaching classes for competitive examinations such as Assam Public Service Commission, Indian Administrative Service, Banking Services, Indian Railways Entrance Exams etc.

There is a course on computer skill which is a part of the syllabus; which is taught in the 2nd and 3rd semesters.

(h) Support for "slow learners":

Remedial classes and tutorials are organized by the departments for the slow learners.

The students are taken to other institutions of higher learning, corporate houses etc. through educational tours and field study. Mention may be made of the following:

- Students of the department of Anthropology were taken to the Dibrugarh University for participating in Indian Anthropological conference (INCCA)-2014.
- Students of the department of Botany were taken to visit Birbal Sahani Paleaobotany Institute, CIMAP, NBRI, Kukrail Herbal Garden and Kukrail Crocodile Research Centre at Lucknow, Dehradun Forest Research Institute and Lloyd Botanical Garden- Darjeeling during last four years.
- Students of the department of Chemistry were taken to visit BCPL in Lepetkata, Dibrugarh.
- Some of the students of the Department of Physics participated in Indian Science Congress held in Calcutta University, 2013.
- Department of Zoology frequently organizes visit to the research facilities at Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), at Lahowal. The students of the department were also visited to the Tea Research Centre Toklai, Jorhat; Zoological Survey of India (ZSI), Calcutta, and Regional Research Laboratory (RRL), at Jorhat during the last four years.

- Students are frequently taken to Universities and Institutions of academic excellence as part of educational tour. For instance, students from the departments of Geography, Statistics and Mathematics were taken to the University of Tezpur, Guwahati, Calcutta, Dibrugarh and to the IIT Guwahati, on many occasions.
- Every year one or two students from the department Mathematics attend MTTS programme organized by National Board for Higher Mathematics sponsored by Govt. of India.

(i) Publication of student magazines:

The college has its own magazine named *Kanoian*. Most of the departments of the college have their wall magazines, wherein different articles, poems, updated news, etc, are being depicted by the students. A few departments have their own bulletins and newsletters published annually.

The ICGC of the college organizes various programmes and events to enhance entrepreneurial skills of the students by introducing career oriented courses. The 5th & 6th semester students of humanities have a skill based course designed to leverage their entrepreneurial skills. The institution arranges for resource persons as and when required to teach the same to students.

Besides these, the institution regularly organizes programme like quiz competitions (P.N. Singh memorial literary quiz is one of them), debates and discussions, different competitions in college week, on World Biosphere Day etc. which encourage student participation in various competitions.

6.1. Institutional Vision and Leadership:

- 6.1.1.  - ➤ Vision: The vision of the college is to provide higher education to students of all sections of the society especially to the underprivileged. The college has adhered to the vision and has evolved a participatory system which allows students, teachers, guardians and non-teaching staff to work in co-operation. It encourages a sense of belonging and ownership among the stakeholders.
 - ➤ **Mission**: The College seeks to realize its vision by providing holistic education to the students so that they can inculcate moral, cultural, socio-economic values and become responsible human resource.
 - ➤ **Objectives:** The College is adhered to its vision and mission. It ensures value education, to foster sustainable development, adequate infrastructure and support system, internal resource generation and its mobilization. It provides a gender friendly ambience, to offer courses relating to human resource development to the learners from all sections of the society.
 - ➤ Core Values: The College strives to create a congenial academic atmosphere which can inculcate values among the learners by providing knowledge. It seeks to create an atmosphere that works for the greater achievement of the people.
 - ➤ Vision for the future: The College envisions a future in which its mission, objective and core values seamlessly coalesce so that it can emerge stronger, committed, accountable and self-reliant.

6.1.2. What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The Governing Body, Principal, Teaching and Non-teaching staffs play an active role in framing policies, programmes and plans, and ensure their effective execution. The management of the college works in synergy to impart quality education and address social concerns and ethical standards.

The nodal authority which implements the strategies and facilitates their resolution is the Governing Body. The Governing Body constitutes various committees from time to time and facilitates the execution of the institutional plans and policies. It consists of ten members including representatives from the Government, Vice Chancellor of the Dibrugarh University, guardians, teachers and employees. The Principal is the member secretary liaising among the stakeholders.

The Principal is the executive head of the institution responsible for execution of all provisions of the University rules and regulations, the UGC guidelines, the instructions of the Higher Education Department of the state. The Principal is the academic and administrative leader who implements the policies and plans, in association with all the stakeholders. There are various committees comprising the Principal, Vice-Principals, and departmental Heads, coordinator of the IQAC, Faculties and Employees work as a team to carry forward its policies.

6.1.3. What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

(a) The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

The Management and Principal ensure a free and fair working environment for the employees. Relevant responsibilities are entrusted to various committees. Regular meetings are held with the various sub-committees of the IQAC, the outcomes are analyzed and utilized for future strategies.

The College Management plays a proactive and productive role in planning and implementing all the academic, curricular and extension activities. Participative decision making and a spirit of team work have resulted in considerable growth of the institution.

(b) Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan:

> Academic:

- The institution has started post graduate programme in English Literature from the session 2016.
- Two skill-based Certificate Programmes viz., Assamese DTP, Page maker and Photoshop and Theatrical Arts started from 2016.
- The college encourages optimum use of ICT enabled learning resources.

> Infrastructural:

The institution has Development Committee, Hostel Committee, Purchase Committee, Library Committee and Construction Committee to plan and implement policies accordingly. Priority is given to needs of the departments.

An infrastructure project for the Science Departments has been sanctioned by the Government of Assam and construction is going on.

> Administrative:

The college authority allots official assignments to the office staff. They are accountable for official assignments.

➤ The Complaints Committee:

In order to ensure a gender friendly ambiance at workplace, the college has the Complaints Committee, constituted in accordance to the Supreme Court guidelines. It attends to complaints, if any, and functions according to the guidelines.

Library and Hostel:

The Library Committee oversees the all affairs of the library. Purchasing of books, periodicals and Journals are advised by the committee. It also

reviews and suggests implementation of readers-friendly measures to ensure maximum utilization of library resources by the users.

The hostel administration is managed by the Hostel Superintendent and Hostel Warden in consultation with the Hostel Committee.

> Extra-curricular & Extension:

Extra-curricular & Extension activities are undertaken by the Students Union Society, ACTA, NSS, NCC, CWSD, SOFEC and various Departmental Forums.

- NCC: There is a unit of NCC for both boys under 10 Assam Bn. and girls under 63 Girls' Bn. Cadets have been encouraged to participate in a number of training camps including participation in the Republic Day Parade at New Delhi.
- NSS: The National Service Scheme unit of the college motivates students to participate in social activities like Blood donation, AIDS awareness programmes, cleanliness drive and rendering voluntary service to the needy.
- **CWSD**: The Cell for Women's Studies and Development of the college is an academic cell that undertakes gender sensitization activities and advocacy.
- **SOFEC**: Society for Environmental Conservation (SOFEC) is an organization formed with teachers and students of the college. It raises environmental consciousness, undertook the activity of planting of trees, and disseminates relevant information through dialogues.

There are other committees, viz., Departmental Management Committees, Examination Committee, Admission Committee, Students' Union Election Committee, Students' Union Society, College unit of the Assam College Teachers' Association, Anti-ragging Committee, Publication Committee, Routine Committee, and Grievance Redressal Cell which aid and facilitate the management in matters of administration and academic affairs.

(c) Interaction with stakeholders:

The college maintains a good relationship with its various stakeholders. This is ensured through guardians-teachers meet, alumni meet, teachers-students union body meetings.

- ➤ Guardians-Teachers Meet: The teachers-guardians meet is usually organised by individual Departments. The guardians are invited to the Departments and intimated about latest academic developments. The guardians are informed of all relevant inputs concerning a student's progression.





> Students Union Society:

- The students being the most important stake holders, are monitored and guided through counseling, organizing social and cultural events (Freshmen's social, Teacher's Day, Parting Social, Farewell etc.). The students are the main stakeholder on various academic, curricular and extension activities.
- The institution has an elected Students Union Society, which looks after the needs of the students. It works together with the college authority to ensure a healthy environment of the institution.

Community:

- The College has an Adopted Tribal Village, *Charaihabi Mising Gaon*, about twenty five KM from Dibrugarh for offering support and guidance for eradicating removing of superstitions, for maintaining a healthy and hygienic life and for better education. The College has facilitated admission to the aspiring students of the village.
- The College has three Adopted High Schools where the faculty members of the College deliver lectures on different subjects.
- The Management has always sought to maintain an interactive & healthy relationship with the community. Many Socio-cultural organisations organise various activities in the college campus which highlights the college among masses. The College has participated in many community drives carried out through its various units like NCC, NSS, SOFEC, ACTA, and CWSD etc. Many of the teachers are active members of different NGOs. The college often interacts with the community through these members and their respective organizations. Activities like Pulse Polio, AIDS awareness, literacy drive, environment awareness, health survey and counseling, legal literacy drive, tree plantation, women empowerment, celebration of girl child week with participation from neighbouring schools, providing training in voice culture to youth aspirants seeking career in music. The college renders valuable service to the government by extending infrastructure support & human resource for organising different programmes and conducting various examinations.

(d) Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders:

At the commencement of each academic session, the Principal conducts meetings with the Staff members, to discuss the forthcoming activities to be

conducted during the session. The Principal also holds meetings with the Head of the Departments at regular intervals and with various other committees like Anti-ragging Committee, Purchase Committee etc. as and when deemed necessary. Interactions with the intellectuals of the various spectrum of the society are the vital sources for deriving policy decisions.

(e) Reinforcing the culture of excellence:

- ➤ The IQAC plays a nodal role in reinforcing the culture of excellence. Academic Calendar, Student's Diary and Teacher's Diary are prepared by the Publication Committee in consultation with the departments' co-ordinate by the IQAC. These are maintained accordingly. The students are boost-up by undertaking field-visits, library visits, industry visits, study-tours etc. Teachers are encouraged to go for various Faculty Improvement Programmes.
- ➤ The Management and the faculty members encourage the students to inculcate social, ethical and moral values among them by giving opportunity to meet eminent personalities and involving them in various creative activities. The students are encouraged to put up Wall Magazines, publish departmental News Letters, contribute to the College Magazine *Kanoian*, and participate in extra-curricular activities.

(f) Champion Organizational Change:

A conscious effort has been made by the authority and the stakeholders with a positive attitude to bring about change and to maintain the reputation of the College where the stakeholders has always been acting as a positive energy for the ongoing changes in the college. The Principal through IQAC acts on the suggestions and ideas from different stakeholders in both formal and informal manner and tries to formulate the different policies for betterment of the institution. There are various committees in the college for different development activities which oversee and implement the respective plans and policies.

6.1.4. What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

- ➤ The College involves participation of all the faculty members and non-teaching staff in decision making and implementation of developmental activities. Distribution of responsibilities helped in improving efficiency and attaining quality management.
- ➤ The College Authority constitutes various committees to look after various functions of the college. The Principal appoints members of the faculty on the basis of experience and ability as convener of committees. Regarding official works, the Principal entrusts various tasks to the non-teaching staff.
- ➤ The Principal coordinates the teaching and non-teaching staff for conducting the administrative works effectively. In this regard, the Principal always makes an effort to motivate all stakeholders towards the accomplishment of the institutional goal.
- ➤ The IQAC adopts an approach for planning and implementing all the cocurricular, extension and outreach activities.
 - > The Heads of Departments manage and monitor the academic affairs of the

department, monitor the progress of the academic programs and arrange peer lectures and other curricular activities. The Departments plans and implements the year-around activities and review it.

- ➤ The Governing Body is the highest policy making body of the institute. The Governing Body discusses the problems and issues relating to the academic and administrative matters of the college.
- ➤ Principal of the college looks after the day to day affairs of the institution in collaboration with the Vice-Principals, and Head of the departments. In addition, different committees formed for looking after academic, financial, co-curricular and extra-curricular aspects.
- ➤ The Governing Body gives ample scope to the Principal and the members of faculty for smooth implementation of academic programs and other curricular activities. The faculty members are encouraged to participate in academic development such as seminars, conferences, refresher courses and take up research.
- ➤ Bodies like the DHSK College Unit of Assam College Teachers' Association and the DHSK College Union Society play their role in the Governance and Leadership of the college.

- ➤ The Management recognizes the importance of leadership qualities in teachers, non teaching staff as well as students. Duties of the College are distributed to the faculties in rotation. Opportunities are provided to the faculty to lead the extracurricular and co curricular activities. Students are oriented to realize their social responsibilities and develop leadership qualities through Students' Union Society, Departmental Study Circles/Forums, NSS, and NCC etc..
- ➤ The head of the department is in charge of all the academic as well as administrative affairs of the department, and is responsible for overall planning and implementation of its activities.
- ➤ There are a number of committees comprising Teachers, Non-Teaching Staff and Students to take care of different activities.

The principal is the member secretary, responsible for conducting and coordinating all affairs. This ensures a wide participation of all the important stake holders in the decision making process.

The institution is operating exclusively on the strength of its stated objectives as specified in its vision and mission.



Performance Appraisal Report is reviewed and analyzed along with the HODs for suggestions and positive outcome. If any loophole or negativity is found, the principal places it before the Governing Body, which directs the concerned HOD to take appropriate measures for better performance. Further the concerned employee is also communicated for better performance.

The welfare schemes in the college are:

- > GPF (Mandatory for all) / (NPS, PRAN),

The Society lends money to its members at a minimum rate of interest in the following categories:



- Housing loan,
- Personal loan and
- Emergency loan
- Accommodation for newly appointed teachers at subsidized rate.
- > Reservation of seats for the children of faculty and non-teaching staff, on merit basis.
- ➤ The Assam College Teachers' Association unit of the College assists their fellow members in times of medical emergency.

Being a prominent college in the region, talented faculties are selected as per UGC norms with a motive to create a healthy academic environment. For attracting eminent faculty the college has policies for granting study leave for higher education. On emergency or unavoidable pressing problems, leave is sanctioned to the faculties.

Both external and internal audit is done annually. External audit is done as per government norms by the audit department of Government of Assam. Internal audit is undertaken annually. Last audit was undertaken during 2015-16. There has been no major objection from the auditors.

Yes, the faculty members are to attend various training programmes and workshops to keep themselves updated. Training sessions are also organized by the college for the non-teaching staff, which helps the staff to work in a better way.

Criterion 7

Innovations and Best Practices

7.1. Environment Consciousness:

7.1.1. Does the institution conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

The college has not conducted a proper green audit of its campus and facilities till now.

7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college buildings are constructed in an eco-friendly manner. The management is keen to preserve eco-friendly ambience in the campus. Following are the initiatives taken by the institution in this regard:

Energy conservation:

There has been a constant effort to create consciousness among students regarding environmental issues like preservation of resources, arresting wastage of water, electricity etc.. The faculties ensure that power is turned off before leaving the respective classrooms. The new buildings are planned for maximum reflection of daylight into the rooms to reduce the need for artificial lighting during the daytime.

➤ Use of renewable energy:

Solar power energy is not used till now.

> Water harvesting:

The region experiences heavy rains resulting in occasional floods. As there is no scarcity of water in the region, water harvesting mechanism is not installed in the college.

Check Dam Construction:

There is no necessity for constructing check dams. The rain water accumulates at the low lying areas at the rear of the college as well as in the two ponds located within the campus.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:

The institution has made no comprehensive policy for checking carbon emissions. It may be mentioned that the College is in the vicinity of the Railway Workshop which emits lots of smoke to the atmosphere.

> Plantation:

Plantation of trees at various occasions is an old practice in the college. The members of the faculty and staff have been engaged in several committees and societies for environmental consciousness. SOFEC is one such society, established in the year 2002, which has been involved in creating awareness through various activities such as tree plantation, film shows, extempore speech, guest lecturers etc. SOFEC has been observing World Biosphere Day, World Environment Day and Foundation Day since its establishment as a part of the awareness program.



> Hazardous waste management:

As there is no source of bio-hazardous waste in the college, therefore the college has not undertaken any measure for its disposal. However, measures have been taken in the laboratories especially in Chemistry by minimizing the use of chemicals by using techniques like Semi-Micro Analysis.

E-waste management:

E-waste disposal is not available; hence all e-waste material is carefully collected and deposited in the store of the college.

7.2. Innovations:

7.2.1. Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

The innovations which were introduced during the last four years (from 2012-2016) are:

- ➤ Introduction of Computer Laboratory for both students and teachers.
- ➤ Initiation of the Prof. P.N. Singh Memorial Inter college Literary Quiz annually by the Department of English.
- ➤ Publication of newsletters by the department of Physics, Chemistry and SOFEC; the journal named *Muse* by the Department of English and the departmental magazine *Dharitri* by the department of Geography.
 - ➤ Publication of the Journal *Vak* the Word by ACTA Unit of DHSK College.
 - ➤ Guardian-Teachers' interactions are initiated in various departments.
 - Make the College Campus a Mobile free zone.
 - Arrangement of remedial and tutorial classes for weak and needy students.
- ➤ Practicing Inter-Department Wall Magazine competition by the Students' Union.
- ➤ Biometric finger print recognition attendance machine was installed for recording the attendance of teaching and non-teaching staff.
 - ➤ Wi-Fi connectivity has been provided in the campus.
 - ➤ Complaint Box and Suggestion Box have been placed
- > Considering the security and safety of the students and employees, and to avoid unfair practices, most areas in the college have been put under CCTV surveillance.
 - > Opening of Bio-tech hub in zoology department.
 - Ramps and Wheel-Chairs are there for differently enabled students.
- > Organizing counseling session for girl-students of the college on the occasion of International Women's Day.
- ➤ Organizing free blood grouping camps as a part of Departmental Outreach Program by the dept. of Anthropology.
- As a result of renovation & expansion of the laboratories, the science departments have increased the number of seats for Major courses.



Presentation of Best Practices:

The two best practices of the institution are:

- > Use of Information and communication technology.
- **Efforts for the holistic development of students.**

(a) Use of Information and Communication Technology:

ICT is used in the following ways:

- Smart Class rooms
- Office Automation
- Digital Library
- Campus Announcement System
- Messenger Software etc.
- ❖ Goal: The goal of the practice is to extensively use ICT for various activities of the College such as teaching-learning process, communication and notification through the College website, paperless communication etc. As an aspect of ICT, the smart class rooms aim to elevate teaching-learning process to new heights.
- ❖ The Context: The technological tools and resources are used for communication purpose and to create, disseminate, store and manage information which were done through paper in earlier years. Thus the use of ICT helps towards reduction in the use of paper. This range of communication technology has also benefitted the teaching faculty in research work. The smart classrooms are introduced in the college as a part of holistic approach to implement an efficient Technology Enhanced Learning (TEL) environment.
- ❖ The Practice: The College makes full use of the computer facilities that are available in all its sections (administrative, academic departments, library etc.). The institution has internet connectivity. It tries to make paperless communication with the various departments. Most of the circulars from the Principal's office are disseminated to the departments through the messenger software. The academic departments in the college have ICT infrastructure with availability of computers, LCD projectors etc. used in teaching-learning activities. The college has a computer laboratory. It has broadband internet connection catering to the needs of learners and teaching fraternity. ICT is also used in the college library. College Management software is used for admission process and management of the office. The College makes full use of three smart class rooms as there are lots of advantages over the conventional mode.
- ❖ Evidence of success: Wider use of ICT has brought several positive changes in the functioning of the college as a whole. In the administration section it has led to easy maintenance of records and smooth and easy transaction. Communication with the various academic departments through internet has led to saving of time and manpower resulting in reduction of paper consumption. It is found that Smart class rooms have been able to attract greater number of students than in the other class

rooms. As the lectures can be saved in the smart boards, it has made it easier for the teachers and students to keep link with the previous classes.

* Problems Encountered and Resources required: Efforts are made to use of ICT in every sphere but not been able to achieve success to the desired level. The strength and consistency of internet connectivity is not satisfactory in this part of the country is also a problem. Fund is also a constraint in procuring more ICT related equipments to meet the needs of the students. With the increasing number of students, the college has to install more Smart class rooms so that each and every student can have an opportunity to attend a smart class. It requires continuous power backup system for smooth running of such classrooms.

(b) Holistic development of students:

Efforts for holistic developments of students are:

- Seminars, talks, workshops, counseling programmes etc.
- > Training programmes for various competitive examinations.
- Awareness programme on ragging and sexual harassment.
- Complaints redress mechanism.
- Cultural and Literary activities etc.
- ❖ Goal: For all round development of students, the departments encourage the students to participate in various extracurricular activities within and outside the college without disturbing their academic assignments. Various Committees and Cells of the College are concerned with the students' overall development by providing security, guidance and creating opportunities to develop their personality.
- ❖ The Context: The Committees are assigned various responsibilities and they plan out different programmes for implementation. For example, the Library Committee proposed to fulfill the necessity of the students by providing books and study material and reading environment. Literary Committee is formed to encourage the students' literary development in creative writing.
- ❖ The Practice: For holistic development of the students various seminars, talks, workshops and counseling programmes etc. are organized by different Cells and Committees. The Library Committee recommends for purchase of books for the students and works for creating a reading environment within the library. To mention a few, The Hostel Management Committee looks after the different affairs of the hostels.
- **Evidences of Success:** The inputs of different committees have resulted in a positive impact. The students actively participate in various events. The participation of students in the workshops is significant.
- ❖ Problems encountered and resources required: One major problem of the students is lack of motivation for self-development. Different counseling programmes are organized to change their mindsets to impart overall development. Lacking of time for both students and teachers is also a major problem. With the tight academic



schedule, it becomes difficult to spare enough time for other activities. Both teacher and student community adjust their work plan by serving overtime to carry out such activities. Insufficient space for some programmes other than academic is also a hurdle of the College. Spaces are managed by optimum use of existing infrastructure, and sometime additional facilities are hired to accomplish the desired goal.

Remaining 565 colleges are recognized under Section 2(1) of UGC Act 1956 but not yet declared fit for receiving central assistance as they do not fulfill the conditions laid down for such status.

The colleges are brought under the purview of UGC in terms of these Regulations as and when the proposals are received from the colleges for inclusion under Section 2(f) and they are found fit for inclusion as per the provisions contained in the Regulations.



DRAFT REPORT ON INTITUTIONAL ACCREDITATION OF DIBRUGARH HANUMANBUX SURAJMAL KANOI COLLEGE (DHSK COLLEGE), DIBRUGARH, ASSAM

SECTION I: INTRODUCTION

Dibrugarh Hanumanbux Surajmal Kanoi College(DHSK College) was established in 1945. Initially it was known as Dibrugarh College and subsequently renamed as Dibrugarh Hanumanbux Surajmal Kanoi College after the name of its donors. It is one of the oldest college of Assam and is located in the heart of Dibrugarh city. This college is a non-governmental grant-in-aid deficit college affiliated to Dibrugarh University. The college has been receiving financial assistance from UGC under different five-year plans. It is, therefore, evident that the college is registered under 2(f) of the UGC and is permanently affiliated to UGC under 12 (B).

There are seventeen departments in this college. The college offers seven under-graduate programmes in Science, ten under-graduate programmes in humanities and, a certificate course in computer application. Out of the total number of eighty teachers seventy-eight are permanent and two are temporary. There are thirty-two non-teaching staff members in the college. The total student enrolment was 1141 in the year 2002. Thirty-seven students hail from out side the state. The temporal plan of academic work of the college is annual system. Besides this college, the management runs another Higher Secondary School. The college has a central library, computer center, canteen, hostels for boys and girls, vehicle parking shed, auditorium and sports facilities.

The college volunteered to be assessed by National Assessment and Accreditation Council, Bangalore and submitted the self study report on December 20,2003.NAAC constituted a Peer Team consisting of Prof.Gauri Dutta Sharma,

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Vice Chancellor, Nagaland University, Kohima as Chairman, Prof. Prasanna K. Biswasroy, Professor of Commerce, Berhampur University, Orisa and Dr. Saktibrata Bhowmik, Principal, Acharya Prafulla Chandra College,

New Barrackpore, West Bengal as members. Dr. K N Madhusudanan Pillai, Academic Consultant, NAAC, co-ordinated the Peer Team visit. The Peer Team has carefully examined the Self study report submitted by the Institution. The Peer Team visited the college on September 29 and 30, 2003 to validate data provided in the self study report. The Peer Team has gone through the relevant documents, visited all the departments, laboratories and support services, interacted with the Principal, teachers, students, non-teaching staffs, parents and alumni. Based on the above exercise and keeping in view of the seven criteria identified by NAAC, the Peer Team has drafted the report in the following paragraphs.

CRITERION-I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The Dibrugarh Hanumanbux Surajmal Kanoi College is affiliated to Dibrugarh University and follows the syllabus offered by the University. The college has 17 departments in Arts and Science streams. It is offering major courses in Assamese, Economics, English, Geography, History, Political Science, Philosophy and Sanskrit for the Arts students. The science students have the option of choosing major courses in Botany, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics, Zoology and Anthropology. The college is offering a self-financing course in Computer Application, which is open for all students.

The students have flexibility to pursue Under-graduate programmes in the elective subjects as per rules of Dibrugarh University. Some of the senior teachers of the college are the members of Broad of Studies of the University. They take


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mechanism to receive feedback from students on teaching programmes through a structured questionnaire. The college takes a minimum period of one year to start a new course. The Management has resolved to introduce the Bachelor in Business Administration and Bachelor in Computer Application courses from the next academic session which is under the active consideration of Dibrugarh University. The college is offering only conventional courses in science and humanities. The college has not introduced any new subjects after 1991. The Management may obtain feed back from academic peers and employers to identify the need based career oriented courses before introducing any new courses.

CRITERION-II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Admission to various courses are on merit cum interview basis. The college is following the reservation policy of the State Govt. The teaching plan is prepared at the beginning of each session in departmental meetings. The teachers complete the syllabus in time. They are committed to their duties and contributed to the academic discipline of the college. In the academic year 2002/2003 there were 180 teaching days out of 255 working days. The students are informed about the method of evaluation, regulations, pattern of questions, distribution of marks and numbers of papers at the beginning of the term. The college conducts unit test and end term examinations. Tutorial classes are taken to help weaker students. Laboratory manuals are supplied to students for practical classes. The college offers remedial courses in subjects like English, Economics, Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry for educationally disadvantaged students. To make teaching-learning process interesting teachers use overhead projector, Audi-Visual Aids,



Charts, Maps and Models. Almost all Science departments have overhead projectors. Students opting major in Botany, Zoology, Geography and Anthropology have compulsory field study and have to submit a project report under the guidance of a faculty member. The project carries 15 marks in a University examination. Some departments in Arts stream conduct educational tours to acquaint the students with the socio-cultural diversity of the country. Teachers' recruitment is as per University / Govt. of Assam norms keeping in view the UGC guideline. The Management appoints teachers on adhoc basis when posts are not filled up by the Govt, and also when teachers proceed on study leave, maternity leave and long leave. The college encourages teachers to avail Faculty Improvement Programme of the UGC and also to participate in seminars and refresher courses. Teachers of the college have participated in 36 State, 27 National and 9 International level seminars. The college has organised two seminars namely, 'Conservation of Bio-diversity of North-East India and Existing Examination System in Assam and its Reformation' with UGC's assistance in 1998

The various co-curricular activities include quiz competitions, debates and seminars. The college is following the self-appraisal method for evaluation of faculty. A few departments have established closed linkages with respective departments of the Dibrugarh University

CRITERION-III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY & EXTENSION

Out of 80 permanent teachers, 28 teachers possess Ph.D. degree and 5 teachers have M. Phil. Sixteen teachers are registered for their Ph.D. on part-time teachers. The college encourages the teachers to acquire research degrees while in

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uGC. Many teachers have published research papers in journals of repute and have written quite a number of books. Faculty members from Anthropology, Zoology and Physcis have participated in International Conferences and presented papers. A faculty member in Geography is recognized as Research guide of Dibrugarh University. A teacher of Anthropology is in the editorial board of a research journal published from Allahabad University. One of the faculty members of the Sanskrit department has received Assam Sahitya Sabha award. One lecturer in Hindi composes poems and also published a novel in Assamese. Teachers in humanities are contributing articles to magazines and newspapers.

The Extension activities are conducted by NCC cadets and NSS wolunteers. Extension activities of NSS includes community development, social work, health and hygienic awareness, environmental awareness and aids awareness camps. The NCC units of the college undertake activities like traffic control, anti-dowry march and literacy programme. Health camps, Aids awareness programme and youth training programmes are also organised with the help of NGOs. The teachers of the college have formed a Society for Environmental Conservation to create environmental awareness.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRICTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Dibrugarh Hanumanbux Surajmal Kanoi College campus spreads on an area of 16.61 acres. The central two-storeyed building accommodates the administrative office, academic departments, library, laboratories, and common rooms.

The college maintains its infrastructure through the college development fund, fund received from UGC and donations from public undertaking companies.

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The College ensures optimum utilization of its infrastructure facilities by providing space for administrative office, classrooms, laboratories, library, common rooms, canteen, auditorium, hostels and space for car parking & cycle stand. The college also offers its infrastructure facilities to external agencies for conducting examinations like Medical Entrance Test, Banking Service Recruitment Tests and also for holding musical and cultural programmes of international standards on regular basis.

The class rooms in the college are spacious. All the science departments are provided with basic infra-structural facilities.

The central library remains open from 10.0 a.m.. to 4.30 p.m.. on 255 working days in a year. It is managed by an advisory committee. The library has 31,596 number of books and it subscribes 12 number of journals/periodicals and 6 newspapers. The library offers no book bank facility for the benefit of the students. Computer facilities are yet to be introduced in the library. The library requires rearrangements of racks to facilitate easy accessibility of books and for better space management. The library does not have reprographic facility. However, the college has a central Xerox machine, which is available for the students on a subsidized rate. All departments have their own departmental libraries.

The college has a computer center with 6 PCs and 5 printers and it offers its services from 7.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m. on week days. Internet system and e-mail facilities are available in the computer center. Students can undergo two months certificates course on computer application paying a fee of Rs. 250.00 p.m. The computer and their accessories are normally maintained by the staff of the college and some times computer experts from outside do the job on need-based requisition.

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The college does not have play ground facilities for major outdoor games and athletic events. However, the college has sufficient land for developing a full-fledged stadium. Volley ball and badminton courts are there. Boys and girls common rooms are provided with indoor facilities like carom and table tennis. Alumni has contributed a multi-gym to the college.

The college has two hostels in its campus, one for the male and other for the female. Both the hostels are two-storeyed with a capacity of boarding 120 boys and 100 girls respectively in each. Girls' hostel has a warden and facilities like mess, telephone, T.V. set are available in the hostel. However, the boys' hostel is run by an external agency on contract basis. The management of this hostel should be under the direct supervision of a committee to be formed by the college. Again this committee should regularly monitor the functioning of the hostel.

The college has a canteen which is leased to an external agency. The canteen is open to both students and to the public. During the interaction with the Peer team students expressed that the canteen facilities might be exclusively for the students.

The college auditorium has a sitting capacity of 700. The college does no have a health care unit of its own.

Two student galleries having a capacity of 150 each have been constructed in the college campus with the funds received from Assam Branch of Indian Teal Association (ABITA).

CRITORION - V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The College admits students on the basis of performance in the entrance test and academic record. There are statutory reservation of seats for candidates

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belonging to SC, ST & Other Backward Classes as per rules. The college produces consistently good results. Students of many science departments have topped in the list of successful candidates in the B.A./B.Sc final examinations under Dibrugarh University. Drop out rate in science stream is considerably high.

The College publishes its prospectus annually. The prospectus furnishes details of academic programmes, eligibility criteria for admission in different subjects, general rules, fee structures, other information regarding the college and the students supports. Advertisement for admission given in local newspapers, cable network and also on the college notice board.

Science laboratories are sufficiently equipped and spacious. Almost all departments possess overhead projectors. Teaching aids like overhead projectors, slide projectors, maps, models are often used for class room teaching. The departments organize departmental seminars for students. Teachers participate in academic and personal counselling. There is an Information & Career Guidance Cell in the college which collects information regarding the academic courses available across the length and breadth of the country and circulate them among the students.

The College has active NCC and NSS Units. Eight cadets of the NCC unit of the college passed 'B' certificates and 3 cadets 'C' certificates in the year 2002. One of the cadets participated in Republic Day parade at Delhi in 2002.

The financial aids are available to students through scholarship, freeship, and student-aid-fund. Students from the backward communities such as SC, ST, OBC and MOBC enjoy all facilities as per rules laid down by the Government. Deserving students receive National Scholarship, Assam Riffle Educational Aids, Nagaland State Govt. Scholarship, Tea Garden and Ex-Tea



Garden labourer and Konch Rajbanshi Scholarship. Remedial classes are held in the college for SC/ST and disadvantaged students with the financial assistance from UGC.

The recreational and leisure facilities are generally available to students. The college hold cultural programmes, indoor games, outdoor games, competition of music and dance. The students are encouraged to participate in debate and to write articles in the college magazine and wall magazine. A good number of students of this college participated in inter college meet, intervarsity meet, Ranji Trophy and National Tennis Tournament. An outstanding cricketer of the college participated in county cricket at England. Special quota is allotted for admitting students of outstanding records in sports.

There is an active alumni association in the college. The alumni of the college are holding various important positions in public and private sectors. Sri Victor Benerjee an outstanding actor is one of the prominent alumni of the college. The alumni association is involved in the general infrastructure development of the college to create a congenital atmosphere for imparting quality education to students. Alumni association has contributed a multi-gym to the college.

A society called 'PILGRIMAGE' run by a group of young teachers in the college in association with teachers & students of other institutions, professionals and youth, is working with an objective to build up self-esteem and confidence in individual student so that they can face the challenges in both their personal and professional lives.

The Society for the Promotion of Indian Classical Music and Culture among Touth (SPICMACY) is functioning in the college to promote cultural activities, especially in the field of music.

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Another organization of the college 'Sindhura Sanskritik Gusthi' is also associated with various cultural and literary activities inside and outside the college.

The college does not have a health care unit of its own.

<u>CRITERION – VI</u>: <u>ORGANISATION AND MANAGEMENT</u>

This college is a non-government institution affiliated to Dibrugarh University and is duly concurred by the State Govt. of Assam. The Assam aided college management rules 1976 (amended in 2001) provides guidance for efficient organization and management of the institution.

The Governing Body, constituted by the Directorate of Higher Education, has 10 members headed by a President. The Governing Body is the apex body and takes all policy decisions. The Principal is the chief executive functionary in academic, administrative and financial matters. The Principal is also the Secretary of the Governing Body, who coordinates and monitors various academic programmes and policies. The Vice-Principal is to take care of academic and other administrative matters as delegated by the Principal from time to time.

The academic calendar is prepared by a committee set up for this purpose and all academic activities are executed accordingly. There are several committees, like admission committee, enquiry committee, examination committee, purchase committee and development committee to help the administration. Each department has a departmental management committee, headed by the departmental head, which supervises and monitors the overall performance of the department.

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The college has introduced a self-appraisal method to evaluate the efficiency and performance of the teachers. This appraisal is to be submitted to the Principal at the end of each academic session. The Principal supervises the activities and efficiencies of the non-teaching staff.

The unit cost of education is about Rs. 22,325.00. The tuition and other fees for the degree students have not been changed for last three years.

The college has developed formal mechanism for the appraisal of teachers by the students. All science departments collect feedback from out going students about the institutions and their experiences during their course of study through a standard format viz the exit questionnaire from the graduate students.

The college provides various welfare programmes to the students. Poor but meritorious students enjoy the free studentship. Teaching and non-teaching staff of the college has formed a thrift and consumer society. The Society offers loan to its members an amount which is three times of the total deposit or maximum of Rs. 50,000/- whichever is less.

The college has recently constituted a Grievance Redressal Committee under the Chairmanship of the Principal. The college has both internal and external audit system. The college has been reeling under a deficit budget for last two years due to non payment of the part of the salaries by the State Government.

CRITERION VII: HEALTHY PRACTICES

- The teachers are invariably using Over Head Projectors for class room teaching.
- → Most of the teachers have published papers in national /international journals. A few have participated in international seminars.

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- Department of English and department of Political Science are publishing news letters.
- Students have dressed code with badges. The attendance of students in the classes is very good. Many departments have produced university level toppers.
- One or two NCC cadets regularly participate in Republic Day parade at New Delhi.
- Alumni Association participates in the development programmes of the college. They have contributed a multi-gym to the college.
- The PILGRIMAGE' an organization of young teachers of the college works in collaboration with professionals and NGOs to create confidence among the students of the college.
- Another organization 'SPICMACY' (The Society for the Promotion of Indian Classical Music and Culture among Youth) takes active part in cultural activities of the college.
- The Department of Zoology has procured a very good collection of ornamental fishes, which they intend to propagate on a commercial basis.
- The campus is clean, green and hygiene. A well maintained avenue of polyalthera trees in front of the college adds to the beauty of the campus.

SECTION - III: OVERALL ANALYSIS

Dibrugarh Hanumanbox Kanoi College situated on a sprawling campus of 16.61 acres has sufficient infrastructure facilities like spacious class rooms, reasonably equipped laboratories and modern teaching aids. Majority of teachers

have research publications to their credit. The students are well disciplined. The college produce consistently good results and many departments in the past had University level toppers. The Peer Team appreciates the various quality measures initiated by the Principal and the team hope that it will be continued uninterruptedly for the sustenance of quality education in the college. For the further improvement of the college, the Peer Team wishes to recommend the following suggestions:

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- The college is offering traditional courses since its inception. Hence, it is high time that the college to introduce the following job oriented courses in different departments on self-financing basis courses in view of their expertise and availability of infrastructure.
 - 1. The Department of Botany may start courses like mushroom culture, medicinal plants, ethno botany, floriculture and food processing.
 - The Department of Zoology may start a course on Piscihy culture and Aquaculture.
 - 3. In view of college's proximity to Oil industries, the Chemistry Department may start a course on Petroleum Chemistry to cater the need of IOC and Oil India.
 - 4. The Department of Physics may start a diploma course in Electronic Science.
 - The Department of Economics may offer courses in Entrepreneur Development, Tribal Economy and Environmental Economics.
 - The Department of History can start courses like Travel and Truism Management and Tribal Studies.

The introduction of new courses are to be finalized in consultation with Academic Peers and Employers and also assessing the local job market in a phased manner.

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- The Peer Team during its interaction with the faculty emphasized the need for the development of research culture in the college. As rightly admitted by the college in its S.S.R. the absence of a research committee has been noticed by the Peer Team. Hence the college may take expeditious steps to constitute research committee which will encourage the teachers with special reference to youngsters to submit minor and major research projects to UGC and other funding agencies like DST, CSIR, ICSSR, ICSR and ICRR etc.
- To make the teaching-learning process more interesting and participative, the college should facilitate LCD and Internet facilities to its students.
- The college can start Yoga center with UGC assistance under direct supervision of the Department of Sanskrit.
- Training programmes for non-teaching staff on office management, book keeping and computer programming may be arranged to improve the efficiency of the staff.
- The Library of the college needs improvement by procuring more volumes of recent books, providing sufficient space and computerization. Further the Library staff may be trained accordingly to provide better facilities to the students.

- The college may introduce Post-Graduate courses in the subject like Physics, Zoology, Anthropology and Economics.
- The Peer Team during its interaction feels that the college should take immediate steps to activate the NSS Unit.
- The college may take necessary steps to make use of the college canteen exclusively for the students of the college.
- The college may take proper steps to build up a full-fledged stadium to encourage sports, games and athletics events of the college.
- The auditorium of the college needs multi-media system for smooth functioning of different academic ceremonies conducted by the college.
- The college should procure advanced PCs to make the Computer Center practical oriented.
- The boys hostel should function under the direct supervision of a committee consisting of faculty members.
- The poor result in humanities is mainly due to failure in the subject of English. Rigorous coaching and remedial classes are needed in English to improve the results in humanities.

The Peer Team is of the opinion of that this exercise will be useful to the institution to initiate the quality education and enhance strategies towards further growth and development.
